# FOUR TECHNIQUES - ONE WEEKEND

# REVIEW OF HUGH, MARGARET & JANE'S WORKSHOPS

In mid-April potters from around Canterbury attended a series of ceramic design workshops hosted at Canterbury Potters' clubrooms. The weekend kicked off with Hugh Rickard demonstrating how to throw one of his magnificent large bowls, then decorate with slips and carving techniques using positive and negative relief techniques. Hugh shared great tips on how to achieve more with less; mirrored tile glued to plywood is a durable and cost effective substitute for a wheel mirror, and hardware store concrete oxides can be used to colour slips at a fraction of the cost. Participants then slip decorated their own pre-made leather hard items and carved their own choice of designs under Hugh's expert guidance. Some beautiful results were achieved with a number on the shelues for firing over the past few weeks.

Sunday morning began with Margaret Ryley demonstrating a series of decorating techniques honed over an incredible 60-year ceramics career. Margaret freely admitted she has "found it difficult to do things carefully" and this is reflected in her flowing, fluid decoration and design. Margaret

encouraged attendees to decorate freely whilst resisting the urge to over-structure surface design; for those who enjoy a structured look there was advice to try "free flow for once and to experiment" as this can open up other pathways. Margaret's session was peppered with great guidance that was useful to both experienced and new potters: "consider the shape of the piece...and look for the design to relate to it", "try to restrict yourself to three colours - I never use more than that", testing is critical - "do it on something small and not too precious otherwise you might be disappointed", and an encouragement to make your own colours. Attendees had time at the end to try some of Margaret's techniques for themselves.

Jane McCulla closed out the weekend with a session on monoprinting and stencilling using underglaze and coloured slips. The session began with Jane demonstrating how to make and colour fresh slip, create freeform monoprints on newspaper, and then decorate clay slabs. Jane's excellent session was filled with advice on choice of underglazes, colours and base clay, along with a few humorous examples of how not to do things. Participants were then able to choose from Jane's wonderful selection of bright, uibrant underglazes and coloured

slips, and get busy decorating their own slabs. Soon the tables were awash with bright, beautifully coloured prints, with a number of oohs and aahs as monoprinted slabs were revealed.

Four techniques - one weekend was a fabulous opportunity to learn new decoration and design techniques, and also meet potters from other clubs across Canterbury. Thank you to Hugh, Mary Lou, Margaret and Jane for sharing your talents with us, and to the CPA committee for opening up this opportunity to others outside of the club.



## MARY LOU'S WORKSHOP BY CHRIS MOIR

Mary Lou Foate led a fun workshop on making decorative clay balls using plaster moulds. Mary Lou showed us her completed examples using intricate shapes such as fish or Christmas presents. This was a hands-on workshop so we then each made a few small or one large ball by forming small shapes and pressing them into the mould. People came with a plan for their shapes or they emerged as we worked on them. The challenge came when the ball needed to be joined and still look like a ball. Mary Lou's experience with this technique came to the fore here and we all successfully completed a ball or two. Thanks Mary Lou!

This is for anyone who wants to make and throw a plate. It is essential that you can confidently centre 800gm of clay and be able to make a clay pad for a bat - if you can't - practice!

In this two-day workshop you will learn how to make plates and trim them. You will be making smaller (18cm) plates for a start to help get the techniques right, then will move on to larger (23cm) plates.

Three methods of making a plate will be taught. The advantages and disadvantages of each method will be discussed.

# EMPHASIS WILL BE ON COLOURED SLIP DESIGN TRANSFER-PRINTING ON PLASTER BATS

This is a rewarding technique often yielding unexpected results. Of course all is revealed in reverse! Kim uses plaster bats like one would a painter's canvas. Paper clay slip will be used in the process. For this workshop we'll be focused on experimenting on small plaster bats. Ice-cream container size bats are ideal. Kim will discuss transfer methods she utilises in her design process - such as slip trailing, paper stencils and more.
